




First Nations Teachings and Perspectives


Tick Season Warning

A reminder to inspect your dogs after they have been out in the woods. There have been Lyme-positive ticks reported on the lake and although only 10% of dogs show any sign of illness, humans have a potentially higher risk for becoming ill. A little preventative action will go a long way.

The Importance of a Dark Night Sky

"Many animals rely on darkness at night to live a healthy life. The majority of organisms, including humans also rely on dark nights to keep circadian rhythms (natural sleep and wakefulness patterns)...". There is lots of fabulous information in this article by The Land Between.

And, don't forget to only turn on the lights you need. Your neighbors (both humans and wildlife) will thank you!

Wildlife Wonders - Dragonflies Dragonflies have been around for 300 million years.

Prehistoric dragonflies were much larger and could have a wingspan of 2.5 feet: wow, imagine that landing on your dock! Their lifespan is short (1-8 weeks) and during that time they can eat from 30 to hundreds of mosquitoes a day. Dragonflies are expert fliers and each of their four wings can work independently. They can fly straight up and down, hover like a helicopter and even fly backwards. They are also known for their incredible vision – almost 360 degrees and best in the insect world. These bug hunters don't sting and generally don't bite humans. In fact, having one land on your head is said to be good luck!


